Planning with pupils what to grow in your polytunnel



Introduction

Use this activity with pupils and others involved in helping to plan what to grow in your polytunnel.

Resources

- 3. A selection of exotic crops

Activity

- I. Choose a selection of photos of fruit and vegetables, see table below for suitable ones to include and mix the photos up.
- 2. Ask pupils to sort them out into crops that should be grown in a polytunnel, crops that are better to be grown outside and crops that could be either.



Top tip

Taste test

Cut up some of your exotic fruit samples and have a taste test at the end of your session.

Make the activity simpler by not including crops from the middle column.

Extended activities

Bring in a selection of more exotic crops – sweet potatoes, pineapples, bananas, okra, aubergines, grapes, kiwi fruit, etc. Plot where they came from on a world map and talk about the climatic conditions they need to grow. Are there any that you think you could experiment with in your polytunnel?
